

RABBIT “RESISTANT” PLANTS

This list suggests some desert adapted landscape plants that seem to be less palatable to rabbits. Be aware that rabbits may eat anything during times of drought. Most plants are also more desirable when they are young, or perhaps over-watered or over-fertilized. New plants fresh from the nursery are very tender and tasty, so they may need some temporary protection for four to six months until they toughen a bit.

Plants can be protected by encircling them with chicken wire (or any type of wire that holds its shape). Make the enclosure large enough to protect the plant when it attains a mature size if you don't intend for the fencing to be temporary. Alternatively, start with chicken wire sized for the plant at the time of installation then replace it with a larger barrier as the plant grows. For best security, bury the wire four to eight inches below ground to deter burrowing bunnies.

An invisible shield might be preferable to the look of chicken wire. Various rabbit repellants in both spray and powder form are available at nursery centers.

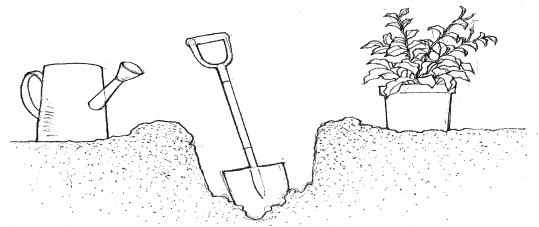
